

UserWay Tutorial – Install on DreamWeaver

<p>Hi everyone. In this tutorial, I'm going to show you how to install UserWay widget in DreamWeaver. You must follow all these steps to get the code snippet that you will later paste in DreamWeaver. Some steps are customization options that you can actually skip and go through them later. But in this video, I will show you all of them.</p>	<p>Woman wearing a UserWay shirt is speaking, her video is in a small box in the lower right corner of the screen. <p>So, visit UserWay.org and click on "Get the Widget."</p>	<p>The cursor moves to the upper right corner of the UserWay website and clicks the "Get the Widget" button next to the UserWay icon. Step 1 of the code generation questionnaire appears.</p>
<p>Step number one is, add your website address. Also, don't forget to agree to the terms of service and privacy policy. Click on "Next" to step number two.</p>	<p>The example website's URL appears in the "What's your website's address?" window. The cursor clicks the "I agree" checkbox and the "Next" button.</p>
<p>And add your name, last name, and your email. Then click on "Next" to step number three.</p>	<p>Step 2 of the questionnaire appears. Sample values appear in these form windows. The cursor clicks the "Next" button in the lower right corner. The form advances to the next page. The cursor clicks the "Next" button.</p>
<p>Choose your preferred icon. You can select among these four icon types. Then click on "Next" to step number four.</p>	<p>Step 3 appears. The cursor highlights the four icon choices, leaving the first (default) option selected. The cursor clicks the "Next" button.</p>
<p>Choose your size. No matter which size you choose, mobile devices will always display the smaller size. Let's continue to step number five.</p>	<p>Step 4 appears, showing the two icon size choices. The cursor hovers over the smaller icon, then clicks the "Next" button, leaving the larger (default) icon size selected.</p>
<p>You can use this color picker to select a different color for your accessibility button. Let's continue to step number six.</p>	<p>Step 5 appears, showing a spectrum bar and swatch selector. The cursor clicks the "Next" button.</p>
<p>Choose where you would like to place your button. of your button. There are eight different positions. Then let's click on "Next" to step number seven, select your language.</p>	<p>Step 6 appears, and the cursor highlights some of the possible icon positions around the perimeter of a webpage layout. The cursor clicks the "Next" button, leaving the upper right (default) setting selected.</p>

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<p>You can let the widget automatically detect the language of your visitor. Or, if you want to force the widget to display in a specific language, then open this list and select yours.</p>	<p>Step 7 appears. The cursor highlights the “Language” field, in which contains the default text, “Auto-Detect Language.” The cursor clicks the dropdown arrow in the “Language” box and a list of languages appears.</p>
<p>Let’s continue to step number eight.</p>	<p>The cursor clicks out of the dropdown menu, restoring the default selection and clicks the “Next” button.</p>
<p>You’re already making your site accessible by installing this widget, but it’s also very important to have an accessibility statement. If you don’t have one, don’t worry about it, because we can help you with that. Just leave “No/I Don’t Know” selected, and we’ll help you with that later. Click on “Next” to step number nine.</p>	<p>Step 8 appears, asking if the user’s site already contains an accessibility statement. “No/I Don’t Know” is the default selection. The cursor clicks the “Next” button.</p>
<p>If you’re interested in advanced custom options for this widget, then I recommend you to click on “I’d like to learn more” for more information.</p>	<p>The form advances to Step 9, displaying an option to learn more about a white-label or custom-branded version of the UserWay widget. The cursor clicks the “Next” button.</p>
<p>But now, let’s scroll down and click on “Next” to our last step.</p>	<p>The cursor scrolls down to click on the “Next” button.</p>
<p>Here’s our code. Let’s click on the “Copy.” And I’ll see you in DreamWeaver.</p>	<p>Step 10 appears, showing a window containing the UserWay script. The cursor clicks on the “Copy” button in the window’s upper right corner. The code is highlighted.</p>
<p>So, I’ve opened my site in DreamWeaver. Code is copied to my clipboard. And now, I’m going to show you how to paste this code in all the HTML files. As you can run UserWay widget on multiple sites, you may want to save this code snippet so you can use it across all your DreamWeaver sites. So, let’s do that.</p>	<p>The screen transitions to the example site’s DreamWeaver page.</p>

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<p>If you cannot see your snippets, then go to “Window,” and click on “Snippets.”</p>	<p>The cursor highlights the “Snippets” tab in the upper right corner of the example site window. Cursor then clicks the “Windows” tab in the top menu of the DreamWeaver site. From the dropdown menu, the cursor highlights the “Snippets” item.</p>
<p>So, let’s go back to our tab and create a new snippet. Let’s click on the icon.</p>	<p>The cursor clicks the “New Snippet” icon in the center of the right menu/toolbar. The Snipped window pops up.</p>
<p>First, let’s name it. So, it’s UserWay widget.</p>	<p>The cursor enters “UserWay Widget” in the Name field.</p>
<p>Then click on “Insert Block.”</p>	<p>The cursor clicks in the “Insert Block” button. The Insert Block window below the button expands.</p>
<p>And down here, let’s paste our code.</p>	<p>The cursor pastes the code snippet into the Insert Block window.</p>
<p>Click on “OK.”</p>	<p>The cursor clicks the “OK” button in the top right of the window.</p>
<p>And here’s our code snippet, and we can use it across all our sites.</p>	<p>The cursor highlights the UserWay widget code file in the Snippets panel.</p>
<p>So, you can see that I’ve opened the “About” HTML page. And to paste this code, let’s scroll all the way down until we find the body closing tag. Here it is. So, I’m just going to click wherever I want to paste the code right above the body closing tag.</p>	<p>The cursor scrolls down the code and clicks in the line above the </body> tag.</p>
<p>And if you go back to Snippets, here’s our UserWay widget. So, just double-click, and the code has been pasted.</p>	<p>The cursor double-clicks the UserWay widget item in the Snippets menu. The snippet appears in the lines above the body closing tag. The cursor highlights it.</p>
<p>And here’s our widget.</p>	<p>The cursor highlights the UserWay widget icon in the DreamWeaver preview panel of the example site’s “About Us” page.</p>
<p>Now let’s go to another page. I’m going to the Files tab and open another page. Let’s open contact.html.</p>	<p>The cursor clicks the “Files” tab. A new menu drops down. The cursor clicks on the “contact.html” item from this menu. That page appears in the menu.</p>
<p>And same thing. Scroll all the way down until you find a body closing tag. Here it is. So place your mouse wherever you want to paste the code and click.</p>	<p>The cursor scrolls down the code and clicks in the line above the </body> tag.</p>

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<p>Now let's go back to "File." So, this website has eight different pages. So, you should paste the code right above the body closing tag in each one of them. Remember to save your files and upload your site to make the changes effective. If you can see the widget on your site, that means that you have done everything correctly.</p>	<p>The cursor double-clicks the UserWay widget item in the Snippets menu. The snippet appears in the lines above the body closing tag. The cursor highlights the UserWay widget icon in the DreamWeaver preview panel of the example site's "Contact" page.</p>
<p>But if you want to double-check the installation, I'll show you how you can do this. Let's go back to userway.org and I'll show you how. You can click on "Let's Verify" to make sure you have installed the widget correctly. But again, if you can see the widget, that means that everything is OK.</p>	<p>The screen returns to the UserWay site page with the script highlighted in Step 10. The cursor highlights the "Let's Verify" button.</p>
<p>So, what you can do is click on "Skip." And here's your accessibility statement. Remember that it is very important to have an accessibility statement. This is a template that we're sharing with you that you can copy, you can add your own details, customize it as you want, and bring it on your site.</p>	<p>The cursor clicks the "Skip" button next to the "Let's Verify" button. The accessibility statement appears.</p>
