<p>Hi everyone. In this video, I'm going to show you how to install UserWay widget in Duda. You must follow all these steps to get the code snippet that you will later paste on your Duda site. Some steps are customization options that you can actually skip and go through them later. But in this video, I will show you all of them.</p>	<p>Woman wearing a UserWay shirt is speaking, her video is in a small box in the lower right corner of the screen. <p>Let's begin. So, visit UserWay.org and click on "Get the Widget."</p>	<p>The cursor moves to the upper right corner of the UserWay website and clicks the "Get the Widget" button next to the UserWay icon. Step 1 of the code generation questionnaire appears.</p>
<p>Step number one is, add your website address. Also, don't forget to agree to the terms of service and privacy policy. Click on "Next" to step number two.</p>	<p>The example website's URL appears in the "What's your website's address?" window. The cursor clicks the "I agree" checkbox and the "Next" button.</p>
<p>And add your name, last name, and your email. Click on "Next" to step number three.</p>	<p>Step 2 of the questionnaire appears. Sample values appear in these form windows. The cursor clicks the "Next" button in the lower right corner. The form advances to the next page. The cursor clicks the "Next" button.</p>
<p>Select the icon that you want to display. You choose among these four. Click on "Next" to step number four.</p>	<p>Step 3 appears. The cursor highlights the four icon choices, leaving the first (default) option selected. The cursor clicks the "Next" button.</p>
<p>Choose your size. No matter which size you choose, mobile devices will always display the smaller size. Let's continue to step number five.</p>	<p>Step 4 appears, showing the two icon size choices. The cursor hovers over the smaller icon, then clicks the "Next" button, leaving the larger (default) icon size selected.</p>
<p>You can use this color picker to change the color of your button, so it matches the rest of your design. Let's continue to step number six.</p>	<p>Step 5 appears, showing a spectrum bar and swatch selector. The cursor clicks the "Next" button.</p>

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<p>Select the position of your button. Select where you want to place your button on your site. There are eight different positions. Let's continue to step number seven, select the language.</p>	<p>Step 6 appears, and the cursor highlights some of the possible icon positions around the perimeter of a webpage layout. The cursor clicks the "Next" button, leaving the upper right (default) setting selected.</p>
<p>Default option is letting the widget to automatically detect the language of your visitor. But, if you want to force the widget to display in a specific language, open this list and select your language.</p>	<p>Step 7 appears. The cursor highlights the "Language" field, in which contains the default text, "Auto-Detect Language." The cursor clicks the dropdown arrow in the "Language" box and a list of languages appears.</p>
<p>Now, let's click on "Next" to step number eight.</p>	<p>The cursor clicks out of the dropdown menu, restoring the default selection and clicks the "Next" button.</p>
<p>Making your site accessible is very important, but it's also important to have an accessibility statement. If you don't have one, don't worry about it, because we can help you with that. Just leave "No/I Don't Know" selected, and we'll help you with that later. But now, let's click on "Next" to step number nine.</p>	<p>Step 8 appears, asking if the user's site already contains an accessibility statement. "No/I Don't Know" is the default selection. The cursor clicks the "Next" button.</p>
<p>If you're interested in advanced custom options for this widget, then I recommend you to click "I'd like to learn more" for more information.</p>	<p>The form advances to Step 9, displaying an option to learn more about a white-label or custom-branded version of the UserWay widget. The cursor clicks the "Next" button.</p>
<p>Now, let's scroll down to our last step.</p>	<p>The cursor scrolls down to click on the "Next" button.</p>
<p>Here it is. So, let's click on the "Copy" button, and I'll see you in Duda.</p>	<p>Step 10 appears, showing a window containing the UserWay script. The cursor clicks on the "Copy" button in the window's upper right corner. The code is highlighted.</p>
<p>I'm in Duda dashboard. Code is copied to my clipboard. And, I'm going to show you where you have to paste this code.</p>	<p>The screen transitions to the example site's Duda dashboard page.</p>
<p>So, on the top menu, you can see there's a code icon. Let's click on it to enter "Developer Mode."</p>	<p>The cursor clicks the "</>" icon in the top menu bar. A window displaying the website's code appears.</p>

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<p>Now, here on the left, scroll all the way down until you see “Site HTML and CSS.” I’ve just selected it.</p>	<p>The cursor scrolls down the menu on the left side of the page and clicks on “Site HTML and CSS,” revealing a dropdown menu.</p>
<p>I’m gonna scroll down and select “Body-end”</p>	<p>The cursor scrolls down the submenu and clicks the “Body-end.html” option. The end of the code window appears.</p>
<p>So, whatever we paste here will be just before the body-closing tag. So, just click. Paste it. And click on “Save.”</p>	<p>The cursor clicks in the window and pastes the UserWay script. The cursor clicks the “Save” button at the top of the window.</p>
<p>Once you’re done, close.</p>	<p>The cursor clicks the “Close” button at the top of the window. A preview of the sample web page appears.</p>
<p>And here’s our widget. Don’t forget to click on “Publish” to make the changes live. If you can see the widget on your site, that means that you have installed the widget correctly.</p>	<p>The cursor clicks the UserWay widget icon in the upper right corner. The Accessibility menu appears. The cursor clicks the orange “Publish” button at the top of the window.</p>
<p>But also, there’s another way to verify this installation. Let’s go back to userway.org and I’ll show you how to do it. You can click on “Let’s Verify” to make sure that you have installed the widget correctly. But again, if you can see the widget on your site, that means that everything is OK.</p>	<p>The screen returns to the UserWay site page with the script highlighted in Step 10. The cursor highlights the “Let’s Verify” button.</p>
<p>So, what you can do is click on “Skip.” And here’s your accessibility statement. Remember that it is very important to have an accessibility statement. This is a template that we’re sharing with you that you can copy, you can add your own details, customize it as you want, and bring it into your site.</p>	<p>The cursor clicks the “Skip” button next to the “Let’s Verify” button. The accessibility statement appears.</p>
