<p>Hi everyone. In this video, I'm going to show you how to install UserWay widget in Joomla. You must follow all the steps to get the code snippet that you later paste on your site. Some steps are customization options that you can actually skip and go through them later. But in this tutorial, I will show you all of the steps.</p>	<p>Woman wearing a UserWay shirt is speaking, her video is in a small box in the lower right corner of the screen. <p>So, let's begin. Visit UserWay.org and click on "Get the Widget."</p>	<p>The cursor moves to the upper right corner of the UserWay website and clicks the "Get the Widget" button next to the UserWay icon. Step 1 of the code generation questionnaire appears.</p>
<p>Step number one is, add your website address. Don't forget to agree to the terms of service and privacy policy. Click on "Next."</p>	<p>The example website's URL appears in the "What's your website's address?" window. The cursor clicks the "I agree" checkbox and the "Next" button.</p>
<p>Step number two. Add your name, last name, and your email. Click on "Next."</p>	<p>Step 2 of the questionnaire appears. Sample values appear in these form windows. The cursor clicks the "Next" button in the lower right corner. The form advances to the next page. The cursor clicks the "Next" button.</p>
<p>To step number three. Here you can choose the type of icon that you want to display. You can choose among the four icons. Let's click on "Next" to step number four, where you will select the size.</p>	<p>Step 3 appears. The cursor highlights the four icon choices, leaving the first (default) option selected. The cursor clicks the "Next" button.</p>
<p>No matter which size you choose, mobile devices will always display this smaller size. Let's click on "Next" to step number 5.</p>	<p>Step 4 appears, showing the two icon size choices. The cursor hovers over the smaller icon, then clicks the "Next" button, leaving the larger (default) icon size selected.</p>
<p>Here with this color picker, you can choose the color of your button, so it matches the design of your site. Let's click on "Next" to step number six, where you can select the position of the button on your site.</p>	<p>Step 5 appears, showing a spectrum bar and swatch selector. The cursor clicks the "Next" button.</p>

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<p>Select your preferred one and continue to step number seven.</p>	<p>Step 6 appears, showing the eight possible icon positions around the perimeter of a webpage layout. The cursor clicks the “Next” button, leaving the upper right (default) setting selected.</p>
<p>Here you can choose the widget’s language. You can let the widget to automatically detect the language of your visitor. Or, if you want to force the widget to display in a specific language, then open this list and select yours.</p>	<p>Step 7 appears. The cursor highlights the “Language” field, in which contains the default text, “Auto-Detect Language.” The cursor clicks the dropdown arrow in the “Language” box and a list of languages appears.</p>
<p>Let’s continue to step number eight.</p>	<p>The cursor clicks out of the dropdown menu, restoring the default selection and clicks the “Next” button.</p>
<p>It’s very important to make your site accessible, but it’s also very important to have an accessibility statement. If you don’t have one, don’t worry because we can help you with that. Just leave “No/I don’t know” selected, and we will help you with that later. Let’s continue to step number nine.</p>	<p>Step 8 appears, asking if the user’s site already contains an accessibility statement. “No/I Don’t Know” is the default selection. The cursor clicks the “Next” button.</p>
<p>If you’re interested in advanced custom options for this widget, then I strongly recommend you to click on “I’d like to learn more” for more information.</p>	<p>The form advances to Step 9, displaying an option to learn more about a white-label or custom-branded version of the UserWay widget.</p>
<p>And last, scroll down to the last step, where we’ll get our code.</p>	<p>The cursor scrolls down to the “Next” button and clicks it.</p>
<p>Click on “Copy,” and let’s go to Joomla.</p>	<p>Step 10 appears, showing a window containing the UserWay script. The cursor clicks on the “Copy” button in the window’s upper right corner. The code is highlighted.</p>
<p>I’m in Joomla control panel. The code is copied to my clipboard. So now follow me to paste the code before a closing body tag.</p>	<p>The screen transitions to the example site’s Joomla management page.</p>
<p>Here in this upper menu, click on “Extensions,”...”Templates,” and again, “Templates.”</p>	<p>The cursor clicks “Extensions” in the top menu bar. A dropdown menu appears, and the cursor clicks on “Templates.” A submenu appears, and the cursor clicks on “Templates.”</p>

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<p>Here you have to select the template that you're working on. I'm going to select mine, which is this one over here.</p>	<p>The example site's Joomla Templates window appears. The cursor clicks on the first template.</p>
<p>Now I'm inside the template, and now you should find the "Index.php" file.</p>	<p>The "Template Customize" page appears.</p>
<p>So, here on the left, here it is. Click on it.</p>	<p>The cursor clicks the "Index.php" document from the menu on the left side of the page.</p>
<p>And now let's search for the body closing tag.</p>	<p>The "Index" page code appears in a window.</p>
<p>So, I'm gonna scroll all the way down. Here it is. This is the body closing tag. So, I'm gonna paste the code right above it.</p>	<p>The cursor scrolls down the code to highlight the &lt;/body&gt; tag.</p>
<p>OK? Just gonna get some space so I can paste the code. Here it is. Click on "Save," and you're done.</p>	<p>The cursor enters a few blank lines above the body closing tag. It returns to the first blank line and pastes the code into the file. The cursor clicks the "Save" button in the lower left corner.</p>
<p>Now let's preview the site.</p>	<p>The cursor clicks "Template Preview" in the upper menu bar. The preview window appears.</p>
<p>And here's our widget. If you see the widget, that means that you have installed everything correctly.</p>	<p>The cursor highlights the UserWay widget icon in the upper right corner. The "Accessibility" menu appears.</p>
<p>But there's another way to verify the installation. Let's go back to userway.org, and I'll show you how to do it. You can also click on the "Let's Verify" button to make sure that you've done everything correctly.</p>	<p>The screen returns to the UserWay site page with the script highlighted in Step 10. The cursor highlights the "Let's Verify" button below the highlighted code.</p>
<p>But again, if already see the widget on your site, that means that everything's OK. So, what we can do is click on "Skip," and you get your accessibility statement. This is a template that you can copy. You can edit, add your own details, and bring it to your site.</p>	<p>The cursor clicks the "Skip" button next to "Let's Verify." A page appears, displaying an accessibility statement.</p>
