<p>Hi everyone. In this video, I'm going to show you how to manually install UserWay widget in Magento. You must follow all these steps to get the code snippet that you will later paste in your Magento site. Some steps are actually customization options that you can skip and go through them later. But in this tutorial, I will show you all of the steps.</p>	<p>Woman wearing a UserWay shirt is speaking, her video is in a small box in the lower right corner of the screen. <p>So, let's start by visiting UserWay.org and click on "Get the Widget."</p>	<p>The cursor moves to the upper right corner of the UserWay website and clicks the "Get the Widget" button next to the UserWay icon. Step 1 of the code generation questionnaire appears.</p>
<p>Step number one is, add your website address. Also, don't forget to agree to the terms of service and privacy policy.</p>	<p>The example website's URL appears in the "What's your website's address?" window. The cursor clicks the "I agree" checkbox and the "Next" button.</p>
<p>Let's continue to step number two. Add your name, last name, and your email. Then click on "Next" to step number three.</p>	<p>Step 2 of the questionnaire appears. Sample values appear in these form windows. The cursor clicks the "Next" button in the lower right corner. The form advances to the next page. The cursor clicks the "Next" button.</p>
<p>Here you can select the icon that you want to display on your site. You select among these four. Let's click on "Next" to step number four, where you can choose the size.</p>	<p>Step 3 appears. The cursor highlights the four icon choices, leaving the first (default) option selected. The cursor clicks the "Next" button.</p>
<p>No matter which size you choose, mobile devices will always display the smaller size. Let's click on "Next" to step number 5.</p>	<p>Step 4 appears, showing the two icon size choices. The cursor hovers over the smaller icon, then clicks the "Next" button, leaving the larger (default) icon size selected.</p>
<p>You can choose the color of your button with this color picker, so it matches the design of your website. Now click on "Next" to step number six.</p>	<p>Step 5 appears, showing a spectrum bar and swatch selector. The cursor clicks the "Next" button.</p>

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<p>Here you can also select the position of your button. You have eight different positions, Let's continue to step number seven.</p>	<p>Step 6 appears, and the cursor highlights some of the possible icon positions around the perimeter of a webpage layout. The cursor clicks the "Next" button, leaving the upper right (default) setting selected.</p>
<p>In this step, you can choose the widget's language. The default option is letting the widget to automatically detect your visitors' language. But also, you can force the widget to display in a specific language. If you want this second option, then open this list and select your language.</p>	<p>Step 7 appears. The cursor highlights the "Language" field, in which contains the default text, "Auto-Detect Language." The cursor clicks the dropdown arrow in the "Language" box and a list of languages appears.</p>
<p>No let's continue to step number eight.</p>	<p>The cursor clicks out of the dropdown menu, restoring the default selection and clicks the "Next" button.</p>
<p>It's very important to make your site accessible. You're already doing that. But it's also very important to have an accessibility statement. If you don't have one, don't worry, because we can help you with that. Just leave "No" selected, and we'll help you with that later.</p>	<p>Step 8 appears, asking if the user's site already contains an accessibility statement. "No/I Don't Know" is the default selection. The cursor clicks the "Next" button.</p>
<p>Continue to step number nine. If you're interested in advanced custom options for this widget, then I recommend you to click on "I'd like to learn more" for more information.</p>	<p>The form advances to Step 9, displaying an option to learn more about a white-label or custom-branded version of the UserWay widget. The cursor clicks the "Next" button.</p>
<p>Now I'm gonna scroll down to our last step, where we'll get our code.</p>	<p>The cursor scrolls down to click on the "Next" button.</p>
<p>Click on "Copy" button, and I'll see you in Magento.</p>	<p>Step 10 appears, showing a window containing the UserWay script. The cursor clicks on the "Copy" button in the window's upper right corner. The code is highlighted.</p>
<p>I'm in Magento, admin panel. Code is copied to my clipboard, and I'm going to show you where you have to paste the code.</p>	<p>The screen transitions to the example site's Magento management page.</p>

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<p>So, on left menu, click on “Content....Configuration.”</p>	<p>The cursor moves to the menu on the left side of the page and clicks the “Content” tab. A submenu slides out, and the cursor clicks on “Configuration.”</p>
<p>And now, click on “Edit: your current store view. So, this is mine. I’m going to click on “Edit.”</p>	<p>The “Design Configuration” window appears. The cursor moves to the row containing the active store view and clicks the “Edit” link.</p>
<p>And, scroll all the way down. And here, “HTML Head.” Click on it.</p>	<p>The Store View window appears. The cursor scrolls down the page and clicks on the “HTML Head” menu item. The Window appears.</p>
<p>Again, scroll all the way down and here, in “Scripts and Style Sheets,” Here’s were you have to paste the code. So, paste the code.</p>	<p>The cursor scrolls down and clicks in the “Scripts and Style Sheets” panel. The cursor pastes the code into the panel.</p>
<p>Click on “Save Configuration.” Now, you’re almost done.</p>	<p>The cursor clicks the “Save Configuration” button in the upper right of the window. The “Design Configuration” window appears.</p>
<p>You just need one more step. You have to flush Magento cache. So, on the left menu, click on “System.” Click on “Cache Management.”</p>	<p>The cursor clicks “System” on the menu on the left of the page. A menu slides out, and the cursor clicks “Cache Management.” That window appears.</p>
<p>And Click on “Flush Magento Cache.”</p>	<p>The cursor clicks the “Flush Magento Cache” button in the upper right of the window.</p>
<p>Once this is done, you can preview your site. As you can see, after flushing Magento cache, here’s the widget. If you can see the widget, it means that everything’s been done correctly.</p>	<p>The example site appears. The cursor clicks the UserWay widget icon in the upper right. The “Accessibility” menu appears.</p>
<p>There’s another way to verify the installation. Let’s go back to userway.org. You can click on “Let’s Verify” button to make sure that you have set up everything correctly.</p>	<p>The screen returns to the UserWay site page with the script highlighted in Step 10. The cursor highlights the “Let’s Verify” button.</p>

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<p>But again, if you see the widget on your site, that means that you have done everything correctly. So, you can click on “Skip,” and here’s your accessibility statement. You can copy this statement, add your own details, customize it as you want, and bring it to your site.</p>	<p>The cursor clicks the “Skip” button next to “Let’s Verify.” A page appears, displaying an accessibility statement.</p>
