Hi everyone. In this tutorial, I'm going to show you how to manually install UserWay widget in Shopify. You must complete all the steps to get the code snippet that you later paste on your Shopify site. Some steps are customization options that you can actually skip and go through them later. But in this tutorial, I will show you all of the steps.	Woman wearing a UserWay shirt is speaking, her video is in a small box in the lower right corner of the screen. So, visit UserWay.org and click on "Get the Widget."	The cursor moves to the upper right corner of the UserWay website and clicks the "Get the Widget" button next to the UserWay icon. Step 1 of the code generation questionnaire appears.
Step number one is, add your website address. Also, don't forget to agree to the terms of service and privacy policy. Click on "Next."	The example website's URL appears in the "What's your website's address?" window. The cursor clicks the "I agree" checkbox and the "Next" button.
And in step number two, add your name, last name, and your email address. Continue to step number three.	Step 2 of the questionnaire appears. Sample values appear in these form windows. The cursor clicks the "Next" button in the lower right corner. The form advances to the next page. The cursor clicks the "Next" button.
Here you can choose the icon that you want to display on your site. You choose among the four icons. Click on "Next," and choose the size.	Step 3 appears. The cursor highlights the four icon choices, leaving the first (default) option selected. The cursor clicks the "Next" button.
No matter which size you choose, mobile devices will always display the smaller size. Let's continue to step number 5.	Step 4 appears, showing the two icon size choices. The cursor hovers over the smaller icon, then clicks the "Next" button, leaving the larger (default) icon size selected.
Here you can pick the color of your button, so it matches the design of your site. Let's continue to step number six, and you will select the position.	Step 5 appears, showing a spectrum bar and swatch selector. The cursor clicks the "Next" button.

As you can see, there are eight different positions. So, just select your preferred one. And continue to step number seven.	Step 6 appears, and the cursor highlights the eight possible icon positions around the perimeter of a webpage layout. The cursor clicks the upper center position, then the upper right position and clicks the "Next" button, leaving the upper right (default) setting selected.
If you want the widget to automatically detect the language of your visitor, then you should leave the default option "autodetect language." But you can also force the widget to display in a specific language. So, go through this list over here and select yours.	Step 7 appears. The cursor highlights the "Language" field, in which contains the default text, "Auto-Detect Language." The cursor clicks the dropdown arrow in the "Language" box and a list of languages appears.
You can continue to step number eight.	The cursor clicks out of the dropdown menu, restoring the default selection and clicks the "Next" button.
So, you're already making your site accessible, but if you also must have an accessibility statement. If you don't have one, don't worry about it, because we can help you with that. Just leave "No" selected, and we can help you with that later. Let's continue to step number nine.	Step 8 appears, asking if the user's site already contains an accessibility statement. "No/I Don't Know" is the default selection. The cursor clicks the "Next" button.
And if you're interested in advanced custom options for this widget, then I recommend you to click on "I'd like to learn more" for more information.	The form advances to Step 9, displaying an option to learn more about a white-label or custom-branded version of the UserWay widget. The cursor clicks the "Next" button.
Now, let's continue to the last step to get our code. So, click on "Copy" button, and we're going to paste it right before the body closing tag of our Shopify website	Step 10 appears, showing a window containing the UserWay script. The cursor clicks on the "Copy" button in the window's upper right corner. The code is highlighted.
I'm in Shopify back-end, and the code is copied to my clipboard. So, follow me. We're going to click on "Online Store." And, click on "Themes."	The screen transitions to the example site's Shopify management page. The cursor clicks on the "Online Store" link in the menu on the left side of the page. A submenu appears, and the cursor clicks on the "Themes" link.

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Here you'll see all the themes that you have. Make sure that we're going to edit your current theme, all right? You might find other themes down here, but it has to be active. So, this is the current theme.	The "Themes" window appears. The cursor highlights the "Current Theme" display and scrolls down the page to show other displays. The cursor returns to highlight the "Current Theme."
Now scroll down a little bit so you can see what I'm clicking.	The cursor clicks the "Actions" button on the right side of the window.
OK. Click on "Actions" and "Edit Code."	The cursor clicks the "Actions" button again. A dropdown menu appears, and the cursor clicks on "Edit Code."
OK, this means that you need to copy the code right on top of it. I'm just going to get some space so you guys can clearly see what I'm doing.	The cursor adds several blank lines above the body closing tag.
Select "Theme Liquid" because this is the site that we're going to edit.	The cursor clicks "Theme Liquid" from the Layout section of the menu. The site's code appears in the right side of the window.
Scroll all the way down until we find the body closing tag. Here it is.	The cursor scrolls down the code. The cursor highlights the tag.
This is it. So, just gonna get some space here to make sure you guys see that I'm pasting the code.	The cursor enters a few blank lines above the body closing tag. It returns to the first blank line and pastes the code into the file. The cursor clicks the "Update File" button in the lower left corner.
SoThis is our code. I've paste it.	The cursor pastes the code into the space above the body closing tag.
Remember to click on "Save."	The cursor clicks the "Save" button.
To make sure you've done all these steps correctly, then, preview the site. I'm going to open it in a new tab.	The example website opens.
And if you see the widget right here, this means that you've installed it correctly.	The cursor clicks the UserWay widget icon in the upper right corner. The "Accessibility" menu appears.
There's another way to check if you've set up everything correctly. Go back to userway.org. And here, click on "Let's Verify" button. But again, if you see the widget on your site, that means you've done everything correctly.	The screen returns to the UserWay site page with the script highlighted in Step 10.

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So, what we can do is click on "Skip," and you get your accessibility statement. This is a template that you can modify. You can add all your details; you can customize it and bring it to your site.	The cursor clicks the "Skip" button next to "Let's Verify." A page appears, displaying an accessibility statement.
