

## UserWay Tutorial – Install on SquareSpace

<p>Hi everyone. In this video, I'm going to show you how to install UserWay widget in SquareSpace.</p>	<p>Woman wearing a UserWay shirt is speaking, her video is in a small box in the lower right corner of the screen. <p>So, visit <a href="https://userway.org">userway.org</a>. and click on "Get the Widget."</p> <p>You need to complete all steps to get the code snippet that you will later paste in SquareSpace. Some steps are customizations options that you can actually skip and go through them later. But in this tutorial, all will show you all of them.</p>	<p>The cursor clicks the "Get the Widget button" in the upper right of the website, next to the UserWay Icon. Step 1 of the code generation questionnaire appears with the example website's URL appears in the "What's your website's address?" window.</p>
<p>Step number one is, add your website address. Don't forget to agree to the terms of service and click on "Next."</p>	<p>The cursor clicks the "I agree" checkbox and the "Next" button. Step 2 of the questionnaire appears.</p>
<p>In step number two, add your name, last name, and email. Then continue. Click on "Next."</p>	<p>Sample values appear in these form windows. The cursor clicks the "Next" button in the lower right corner. The form advances to the next page. The cursor clicks the "Next" button. Step 3 appears.</p>
<p>And in step number three, you can choose your preferred icon. You choose among the four. Let's continue to step number four, where you will choose the size.</p>	<p>The cursor highlights the four icon choices, leaving the first (default) option selected. The cursor clicks the "Next" button. Step 4 appears, showing the two icon size choices.</p>
<p>No matter which size you choose, mobile devices will always display this smaller one.</p>	<p>The cursor hovers over the smaller icon, then clicks the "Next" button, leaving the larger (default) icon size selected.</p>
<p>Now continue to step number 5. In this step get to choose the color of your button, so it can match the design of your site. Now let's continue to step number six.</p>	<p>Step 5 appears, showing a spectrum bar and swatch selector. The cursor clicks the "Next" button.</p>

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<p>Here you will select the position of the button. As you can see, there are eight different positions. So, select the one you prefer and continue to step number seven.</p>	<p>Step 6 appears, and the cursor highlights the eight possible icon positions around the perimeter of a webpage layout. The cursor clicks the “Next” button, leaving the upper right (default) setting selected.</p>
<p>You can let the widget auto-detect the language of your visitor, or you can force the widget to display in a specific language. Then click this list with all the available languages. Now let’s continue to step number eight.</p>	<p>Step 7 appears. The cursor highlights the “Language” field, in which contains the default text, “Auto-Detect Language.” The cursor clicks the dropdown arrow in the “Language” box and a list of languages appears.</p>
<p>So, if you’re watching this, you already know the importance of making your website accessible. But it’s also important to have an accessibility statement. If you don’t have one, don’t worry about it, because we can help you with that. Just leave “No” selected, and then we’ll help you with that later. Let’s continue to step number nine.</p>	<p>Step 8 appears, asking if the user’s site already contains an accessibility statement. “No/I Don’t Know” is the default selection. The cursor clicks the “Next” button. The cursor clicks out of the dropdown menu, restoring the default selection and clicks the “Next” button.</p>
<p>And if you’re interested in advanced custom options for this widget, then I recommend you to select “I’d like to learn more” for more information. But now I’m gonna continue the last step.</p>	<p>The form advances to Step 9, displaying an option to learn more about a white-label or custom-branded version of the UserWay widget. The cursor clicks the “I’d Like to Learn More” button, then the “Next” button. Step 10 appears, showing a window containing the UserWay script.</p>
<p>Here’s the code. So, select “Copy” and let’s go to SquareSpace.</p>	<p>The cursor clicks on the “Copy” button in the window’s upper right corner. The code is highlighted.</p>
<p>I’m in SquareSpace website editor. I already got my code, so now let’s go to “Settings.”</p>	<p>The screen transitions to the example site’s SquareSpace editor page. The cursor clicks on the “Settings” tab in the left menu bar. The “Settings” menu appears.</p>
<p>Scroll all the way down to “Advanced.”</p>	<p>The “cursor scrolls down and clicks “Advanced. A new menu appears.</p>
<p>And in “Code Injection,” go all the way to “Footer.”</p>	<p>The cursor clicks “Code Injection” and that screen appears. The cursor scrolls past a “Header” window and clicks inside the “Footer” window.</p>

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Here's where you have to paste the code.	The cursor pastes the code into the "Footer" window.
This is the code. I'm going to paste it and click on "Save."	The cursor clicks the "Save" button in the upper left corner.
Let's go back to preview the site.	The SquareSpace site preview page appears.
And here it is. And here's our widget. If you can see the widget on your site, this means that you have installed it correctly.	The cursor highlights the UserWay widget icon in the upper right corner.
But also I will show you another way to verify your installation from UserWay.org.	The site appears. The cursor clicks the UserWay widget icon in the upper right corner. The Accessibility menu appears.
So, I'm going back to the site.	Step 10 from the installation process appears, showing the snippet highlighted in the code window.
And you can click on "Let's Verify" to make sure that you have set up the widget correctly. Or you just can skip this last step.	The cursor highlights the "Let's Verify" button. The cursor clicks the "Skip" button next to "Let's Verify."
And here's your accessibility statement. This is a template that you can copy. You can modify it as you want and add it to your website so you'll have your own accessibility statement.	The accessibility statement appears.
