<p>Hi everyone. In this video, I'm going to show you how to install UserWay widget in Tilda. You must follow all these steps to get the code snippet that you will later paste on your site. Some steps are customization options that you can actually skip and go through them later. But in this video, I will show you all of them.</p>	<p>Woman wearing a UserWay shirt is speaking, her video is in a small box in the lower right corner of the screen. <p>First thing you have to do is visit UserWay.org and click on "Get the Widget."</p>	<p>The cursor moves to the upper right corner of the UserWay website and clicks the "Get the Widget" button next to the UserWay icon. Step 1 of the code generation questionnaire appears.</p>
<p>Step number one is, add your website address. Also, don't forget to agree to the terms of service and privacy policy. Click on "Next" to step number two.</p>	<p>The example website's URL appears in the "What's your website's address?" window. The cursor clicks the "I agree" checkbox and the "Next" button.</p>
<p>And add your name, last name, and your email. Then click on "Next" to step number three.</p>	<p>Step 2 of the questionnaire appears. Sample values appear in these form windows. The cursor clicks the "Next" button in the lower right corner. The form advances to the next page. The cursor clicks the "Next" button.</p>
<p>You can select the icon that you want to display. You choose among these four. Click on "Next" to step number four.</p>	<p>Step 3 appears. The cursor highlights the four icon choices, leaving the first (default) option selected. The cursor clicks the "Next" button.</p>
<p>Select the size. No matter which size you choose, mobile devices will always display the smaller size. Let's continue to step number 5.</p>	<p>Step 4 appears, showing the two icon size choices. The cursor hovers over the smaller icon, then clicks the "Next" button, leaving the larger (default) icon size selected.</p>
<p>Use this color picker to change the color of your button. Then click on "Next" to step number six – select the position.</p>	<p>Step 5 appears, showing a spectrum bar and swatch selector. The cursor clicks the "Next" button.</p>
<p>Here's where you choose in which part of your site you want to display the button. There are eight different positions. Now let's continue to step number seven.</p>	<p>Step 6 appears, and the cursor highlights some of the possible icon positions around the perimeter of a webpage layout. The cursor clicks the "Next" button, leaving the upper right (default) setting selected.</p>

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<p>Choose the language. The default option is letting the widget to automatically detect the language of the visitor. But if you want to force the widget to display in a specific language, then you can open this list and select your language.</p>	<p>Step 7 appears. The cursor highlights the “Language” field, in which contains the default text, “Auto-Detect Language.” The cursor clicks the dropdown arrow in the “Language” box and a list of languages appears.</p>
<p>Now let’s continue to step number eight.</p>	<p>The cursor clicks out of the dropdown menu, restoring the default selection and clicks the “Next” button.</p>
<p>It’s very important to make your website accessible. But it’s also very important to have an accessibility statement. If you don’t have one, don’t worry about it, because we can help you with that. Just leave “No/I Don’t Know” selected, and we’ll help you with that later. Let’s continue to step number nine.</p>	<p>Step 8 appears, asking if the user’s site already contains an accessibility statement. “No/I Don’t Know” is the default selection. The cursor clicks the “Next” button.</p>
<p>If you’re interested in advanced custom options for this widget, then I recommend you to click “I’d like to learn more” for more information.</p>	<p>The form advances to Step 9, displaying an option to learn more about a white-label or custom-branded version of the UserWay widget. The cursor clicks the “Next” button.</p>
<p>Now I’m gonna scroll down to our last step.</p>	<p>The cursor scrolls down to click on the “Next” button.</p>
<p>Here’s our code. So, let’s click on “Copy,” and I’ll see you in Tilda.</p>	<p>Step 10 appears, showing a window containing the UserWay script. The cursor clicks on the “Copy” button in the window’s upper right corner. The code is highlighted.</p>
<p>I’m in Tilda dashboard. The code is copied to my clipboard, and I’ll show you where you have to paste it.</p>	<p>The screen transitions to the example site’s Tilda dashboard page.</p>
<p>So, select the website where you want to place UserWay widget. This is mine. So, click on “Edit Website.”</p>	<p>The cursor clicks the “Edit Website” button beneath the example website listing. The website’s Tilda page appears.</p>
<p>And click on “Site Settings.”</p>	<p>The cursor clicks the “Site Settings” button in the upper right. That page loads.</p>
<p>Here let’s scroll all the way down to “More.”</p>	<p>The cursor scrolls down the left menu and clicks on the “More” option. A new page loads.</p>

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<p>And in the “HTML Code for Head-Zone,” here’s where we have to click on “Edit Code.”</p>	<p>The cursor clicks the “Edit Code” button beneath the “HTML Code for Head-Zone” subhead. That panel loads.</p>
<p>And paste our code. Click on “Save,” and we’re done.</p>	<p>The cursor pastes the UserWay code snippet into the panel. The cursor clicks the orange “Save” button.</p>
<p>Now let’s preview our site. So, let’s go back to the dashboard. And I’m clicking on the link to preview the site.</p>	<p>The cursor clicks the “Dashboard” tap in the top navigation bar. The example page’s Tilda page appears. The cursor clicks the example site’s preview link and the example website appears.</p>
<p>So, here’s our widget. If you can see the widget, that means that you have done everything correctly. Also, there’s another way to double-check this installation. I’m gonna go back to userway.org and show you how to do it.</p>	<p>The cursor clicks the UserWay widget icon in the upper right corner. The Accessibility menu appears.</p>
<p>You can click on “Let’s Verify” button to double-check the setup. But again, if you can see the widget properly, that means that everything is OK.</p>	<p>The screen returns to the UserWay site page with the script highlighted in Step 10. The cursor highlights the “Let’s Verify” button.</p>
<p>So, what you can do is click on “Skip.” And here’s your accessibility statement. This is a template that we’re sharing with you. You can copy it, edit, customize it, add your own details, and paste it on your site.</p>	<p>The cursor clicks the “Skip” button next to the “Let’s Verify” button. The accessibility statement appears.</p>
